Anticipatory Set: How are the designs of farm buildings (barns) today different from those in the late 1800s, and the early 1900s?

Purpose: Students will use the internet to search for information concerning barns

and barn raisings:

Objective: Students will develop an understanding of the importance of the barn in

our nation's history by searching for information on barns on the internet.

Teaching to the Objective:

1. Hand out internet search questions to students.

- 2. Explain the difference between search engines and URL addresses.
- 3. Have students search to find the answers to questions.
- 4. After completion—have students share whether finding the information was difficult or easy.
- 5. Have students share information that they found and the web sites where they found the information.

Internet Scavenger Hunt

Look for the answers to these questions as you search the internet. Write down your answers and then as a class share the information that you found. What new knowledge do you have about barns after doing the search?

Where do we get out ideas about barns?

- 1. Find a barn on the internet that is featured in an advertisement? What product is being sold? Why do you think that the company decided to use a barn in its ad?
- 2. How were barns used as road side advertising? Why do you think that this was done?
- 3. Find a image of a barn that is made specifically for children. What is the title of the image or what is it printed on? Does it look like a real barn? Why or why not?
- 4. Find a photograph of an illustration or artist's picture of a farm printed over 100 years ago. What is its title? How do you think the artist or photographer wanted you to feel when you look at the picture?


